Policy on Public Hearings and Conduct at Public Meetings



Public Hearing/Public Meeting

A public hearing is a formal opportunity for citizens to give their views to the Town Council for consideration in its decision making process on a specific issue. At a minimum, a public hearing shall provide for submission of both oral and written testimony for and against the action or matter at issue.

Oral Communication

It is the Council's goal that citizens resolve their complaints for service or regarding employees' performance at the staff level. However, it is recognized that citizens may from time to time believe it is necessary to speak to Town Council on matters of concern. Accordingly, Town Council expects any citizen to speak in a civil manner, with due respect for the decorum of the meeting, and with due respect for all persons attending.

- No member of the public shall be heard until recognized by the presiding officer.
- Public comments related to non-agenda items will only be heard during the Public Comment portion of the meeting unless the issue is a Public Hearing. Public comments specifically related to an agenda item will be heard immediately prior to the Council taking up the item for deliberation.
- Speakers must state their name for the record.
- Any citizen requesting to speak shall limit him or herself to matters of fact regarding the issue of concern.
- Comments should be limited to three (3) minutes unless prior approval by the presiding officer.
- If a representative is elected to speak for a group, the presiding officer may approve an increased time allotment.
- If a response from the Council or Board is requested by the speaker and cannot be made verbally at the Council or Board meeting, the speaker's concerns should be addressed in writing within two weeks.
- Personal attacks made publicly toward any citizen, council member, or town employees are not allowed. Citizens are encouraged to bring their complaints regarding employee performance through the supervisory chain of command.

Any member of the public interrupting Town Council proceedings, approaching the dais without permission, otherwise creating a disturbance, or failing to abide by these rules of procedure in addressing Town Council, shall be deemed to have disrupted a public meeting and, at the direction of the presiding officer, shall be removed from the meeting room by Police Department personnel or other agent designated by Town Council or Operations Manager.

General Town Council Meeting Information

- Regular Town Council meetings are held at 7:00 PM on the first and third Tuesdays of each month at the West Yellowstone Town Hall, 440 Yellowstone Avenue, West Yellowstone, Montana.
- Presently, informal Town Council work sessions are held at 12 Noon on Tuesdays and occasionally on other mornings and evenings. Work sessions also take place at the Town Hall located at 440 Yellowstone Avenue.
- The schedule for Town Council meetings and work sessions is detailed on an agenda. The agenda is a list of business items to be considered at a meeting. Copies of agendas are available at the entrance to the meeting room.
- Agendas are published at least 48 hours prior to Town Council meetings and work sessions. Agendas are posted at the Town Offices and at the Post Office. UPDATED MEMORANDUM

RE: Marijuana laws
DATE: April 1, 2022

The Montana legislature passed HB 701, the Montana Marijuana Regulation and Taxation Act, following the I-190 affirmative vote to allow recreational marijuana, now commonly called "Adult Use" marijuana in Montana. HB 701 provided how and when marijuana businesses could be regulated and by whom. The types of marijuana businesses that are included are dispensary, cultivation, manufacture, medical dispensary, combined use licenses, testing labs and transportation.

The bill is codified, in part, at **Title 16**, **Chapter 12**, **MCA**, a copy of which is attached. If a town is located within a county that voted to allow adult use, the law allows that Town to either prohibit any or all of the different types of marijuana businesses and or to regulate them. Gallatin County electors voted to allow adult use.

Regulation

If the Town desires to allow marijuana businesses, it should undertake a study to determine where such businesses could be located and what, if any restrictions should be placed on the business. Any regulations by the Town will be in addition to the restrictions provided by state law and the Department of Revenue rules. Further, if the Town allows such businesses, it could enact a local option tax to receive part of the tax revenue that DOR will collect. The regulation of such businesses should be included in the zoning regulation review/update currently underway, even if the Council does resolve to prohibit such businesses.

Prohibition

If the Town Council wants to allow the voters to decide whether to prohibit such businesses, it must follow the process set out in Title 16, by putting a resolution prohibiting any or all of the marijuana business listed above from operating in the Town on a ballot and holding an election.

If the voters elect to prohibit such businesses, the Town may not allow any businesses that were included on the ballot within its limits. Note, the Town cannot stop licensed transporters from transporting marijuana through the Town.

If the ballot measure fails, then such businesses may operate within the Town and the Town should regulate them through zoning.

While the law becomes effective January 1, 2022, there is still a "transition' period that is built into the DOR regulations. In January, the only business that can sell adult use marijuana are the dispensaries that were licensed by the Department on or before November 3, 2020 for medical

marijuana. Therefore, the only business that could sell adult use marijuana in West Yellowstone is LPC West Yellowstone. The DOR will not accept any applications for new marijuana dispensaries, manufacturer or cultivation businesses, that are not former medical marijuana licensees, until July 1, 2023. See ARM 42.39 et.seq.

If the Council desires to put the issue of a prohibition to the voters, it must pass a Resolution to do so more than 85 days prior to the date of the election. The general election is November 8, 2022 so a resolution would have to be passed on or before August 8 and in order to avoid any doubt, would urge the Town to have the resolution adopted by its first meeting in July.

Attached are **examples** from the Town of Manhattan and the City of Billings. Manhattan resolved to have the electors decide to ban all types of businesses, Billings resolved to only ban adult use dispensaries.

TITLE 16. ALCOHOL, TOBACCO, AND MARIJUANA CHAPTER 12. MARIJUANA REGULATION AND TAXATION Part 3. Local Government and Law Enforcement Authority

Local Government Authority To Regulate -- Opt-In Requirement In Certain Counties -- Exemption For Existing Licensees

16-12-301. Local government authority to regulate -- opt-in requirement in certain counties -- exemption for existing licensees. (1) (a) Except as provided in subsection (1)(b), a marijuana business may not operate in a county in which the majority of voters voted against approval of Initiative Measure No. 190 in the November 3, 2020, general election until:

- (i) the category or categories of license that the marijuana business seeks has or have been approved by the local jurisdiction where the marijuana business intends to operate as provided in subsection (3) or (4); and
 - (ii) the business is licensed by the department pursuant to this chapter.
- (b) A former medical marijuana licensee that does not apply for licensure as an adult-use dispensary may operate in its existing premises in compliance with rules adopted by the department pursuant to 16-12-201(2) notwithstanding a local jurisdiction's failure to take action pursuant to subsections (3) through (6).
- (c) A former medical marijuana licensee that intends to apply for licensure as a cultivator, manufacturer, adult-use dispensary, or testing laboratory may operate in compliance with rules adopted by the department pursuant to 16-12-201(2) notwithstanding a local jurisdiction's failure to take action pursuant to subsections (3) through (6), provided that the former marijuana licensee has remained in good standing with the department of public health and human services and the department.
- (d) For the purpose of this section, the marijuana business categories that must be approved by a local jurisdiction under subsections (3) through (6) in a county in which the majority of voters voted against approval of Initiative Measure No. 190 in the November 3, 2020, general election before a business may operate are:
 - (i) cultivator;
 - (ii) manufacturer;
 - (iii) medical marijuana dispensary, except as provided in subsection (1)(b);
 - (iv) adult-use dispensary;
 - (v) combined-use marijuana licensee;
 - (vi) testing laboratory; and
 - (vii) marijuana transporter facility.

- (e) Marijuana businesses located in counties in which the majority of values voted to approve Initiative Measure No. 190 in the November 3, 2020, general election are not subject to the local government approval process under subsections (3) through (6).
- (2) (a) To protect the public health, safety, or welfare, a local government may by ordinance or otherwise regulate a marijuana business that operates within the local government's jurisdictional area. The regulations may include but are not limited to inspections of licensed premises, including but not limited to indoor cultivation facilities, dispensaries, manufacturing facilities, and testing laboratories in order to ensure compliance with any public health, safety, and welfare requirements established by the department or the local government.
- (b) A former medical marijuana licensee that does not apply for licensure as an adult-use dispensary is exempt from complying with any local governmental regulations that are adopted under this subsection after July 1, 2021, until its first license renewal date occurring after January 1, 2022, or the expiration of any grace period granted by the locality, whichever is later.
- (3) An election regarding whether to approve any or all of the marijuana business categories listed in subsection (1)(d) to be located within a local jurisdiction may be requested by filing a petition in accordance with 7-5-131 through 7-5-135 and 7-5-137 by:
 - (a) the qualified electors of a county; or
 - (b) the qualified electors of a municipality.
- (4) (a) An election held pursuant to this section must be called, conducted, counted, and canvassed in accordance with Title 13, chapter 1, part 4.
- (b) An election pursuant to this section may be held in conjunction with a regular election of the governing body, general election, or a regular local or special election.
- (5) If the qualified electors of a county vote to approve a type of marijuana business to be located in the jurisdiction, the governing body shall enter the approval into the records of the local government and notify the department of the election results.
- (6) (a) If an election is held pursuant to this section in a county that contains within its limits a municipality of more than 5,000 persons according to the most recent federal decennial census:
- (i) it is not necessary for the registered qualified electors in the municipality to file a separate petition asking for a separate or different vote on the question of whether to prohibit a category of marijuana business from being located in the municipality; and
- (ii) the county shall conduct the election in a manner that separates the votes in the municipality from those in the remaining parts of the county.
- (b) If a majority of the qualified electors in the county, including the qualified electors in the municipality, vote to approve a category of marijuana business to be located in the county, the county may allow that category of marijuana business to operate in the county.
- (c) (i) If a majority of the qualified electors in the municipality vote to approve a category of marijuana business to be located in the municipality, the municipality may allow that type of marijuana business to operate in the municipality.
- (ii) If a majority of the qualified electors in the municipality vote to prohibit a category of marijuana business from being located in the municipality, the municipality may not allow that type of marijuana business to operate in the municipality.



- (d) Nothing contained in this subsection (6) prevents any municipality ... m having a separate election under the terms of this section.
- (7) (a) A county or municipality that has voted to approve a category of marijuana business to be located in the jurisdiction or a county in which the majority of voters voted to approve Initiative Measure No. 190 in the November 3, 2020, general election may vote to prohibit the previously approved or allowed operations within the jurisdiction.
- (b) A vote overturning the approval of a category of marijuana business or prohibiting the previously permitted operation of marijuana businesses is effective on the 90th day after the local election is held.
- (8) A local government may not prohibit the transportation of marijuana within or through its jurisdiction on public roads by any person licensed to do so by the department or as otherwise allowed by this chapter.

Local Government Taxing Authority -- Specific Delegation

16-12-309. (Effective January 1, 2022) Local government taxing authority -- specific delegation. As required by **7-1-112**, **16-12-309** through **16-12-312**, and **16-12-317** specifically delegate to the qualified electors of a county the power to authorize their county to impose a local-option marijuana excise tax within the corporate boundary of the county.

Limit On Local-Option Marijuana Excise Tax Rate -- Goods Subject To Tax

16-12-310. (Effective January 1, 2022) Limit on local-option marijuana excise tax rate -- goods subject to tax. (1) The rate of the local-option marijuana excise tax must be established by the election petition or resolution provided for in **16-12-311**, and the rate may not exceed 3%.

- (2) The local-option marijuana excise tax is a tax on the retail value of all marijuana and marijuana products sold at an adult-use dispensary or medical marijuana dispensary within a county.
 - (3) If a county imposes a local-option marijuana excise tax:
 - (a) 50% of the resulting tax revenue must be retained by the county;
- (b) 45% of the resulting tax revenue must be apportioned to the municipalities on the basis of the ratio of the population of the city or town to the total county population; and
- (c) the remaining 5% of the resulting tax revenue must be retained by the department to defray costs associated with administering 16-12-309 through 16-12-312 and 16-12-317. The funds retained by the department under this subsection (3)(c) must be deposited into the marijuana state special revenue account established under 16-12-111.
- (4) For the purposes of this section, "tax revenue" means the combined taxes collected under any localoption marijuana excise tax collected on retail sales within the county.

RESOLUTION NO.

A RESOLUTION OF THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF MANHATTAN, MONTANA, REFERRING A PROPOSED ORDINANCE TO PROHIBIT ALL MARIJUANA BUSINESSES FROM OPENING OR OPERATING WITHIN THE TOWN TO A VOTE OF THE PEOPLE AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 2022. THE TYPES OF MARIJUANA BUSINESSES TO BE PROHIBITED ARE ADULT USE DISPENSARY, MANUFACTURER, CULTIVATOR, TESTING LABS, MEDICAL MARIJUANA DISPENSARY AND TRANSPORTER FACILITIES.

<u>WHEREAS</u>: The voters in Gallatin County, Montana voted to approve Initiative 190 on November 2, 2020, allowing for adult use of marijuana and providing for approval of certain marijuana businesses within the State of Montana; and

<u>WHEREAS:</u> In 2021, the Montana Legislature passed House Bill 701, which was codified at Title 16, Chapter 12, Montana Code Annotated and which set out rules and regulations for marijuana businesses; and

<u>WHEREAS:</u> Title 16, Chapter 12, MCA, provides an option for electors of municipalities to consider whether to prohibit any or all of the marijuana businesses identified in Section 16-12-301(d), MCA; and

<u>WHEREAS</u>: on November 10, 2021, the Town Council of the Town of Manhattan discussed submitting to the voters the issue of whether to permanently prohibit all or any category of marijuana businesses from locating or operating within the limits of the Town of Manhattan; and

<u>WHEREAS:</u> pursuant to Title 16, chapter 12, a majority of the electors voting on this question must approve the proposed ordinance to prohibit adult use marijuana businesses; and

<u>WHEREAS</u>: the Town Council of the Town of Manhattan believes the proposed ordinance should be referred to a vote of the people at an election to be held on November 8, 2022.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF MANHATTAN:

1. The Town Council of the Town of Manhattan has proposed an ordinance prohibiting the marijuana businesses listed in §3 below, within the limits of the Town of Manhattan and hereby refers this question to a vote of the people at an election to be held on November 8, 2022.

CITY OF BILLINGS MARIJUANA DISPENSARY ORDINANCE **PROPOSITION**

Summary: Initiative Measure 190 (I-190) was approved by the electors of the City of Billings in the general election held November 3, 2020, legalizing possession and use of marijuana for adults over the age of 21 as well as certain marijuana businesses. The Montana Legislature passed House Bill 701 in 2021 and modified provisions of I-190 providing an option for electors to consider prohibition of the seven categories of marijuana businesses. This ballot measure asks voters to approve or disapprove adult-use marijuana dispensaries, which is one of the various types of marijuana businesses which were authorized by House Bill 701. The use and possession of marijuana for adults over the age of 21 and the remaining categories of marijuana businesses will not be impacted by this vote, including medical marijuana dispensaries, and will be permitted in the City of Billings upon the effective date of House Bill 701.

Proposal: The Billings City Council has proposed an ordinance to prohibit adultuse marijuana dispensaries and passed Resolution 21-10981 to submit this ballot to the voters. Adult-use dispensary means a licensed premises from which a person licensed by the Montana Department of Revenue may sell marijuana or marijuana products to both registered cardholders and adults that are 21 years of age or older. This proposed ordinance would not prohibit the operation of medical marijuana dispensaries within the City of Billings.

BALLOT ISSUES CONTINUED

CITY OF BILLINGS MILL LEVY PROPOSITION

Summary: Violent crime rates and calls for emergency services have increased over the past 10 years. This ballot measure asks voters to approve or disapprove an additional permanent annual levy up to 34 mills to increase investments to police, fire prosecution services code enforcement, municipal court, mental health and substance abuse services, and related public safety expenses. The amount raised by the new levy, when fully implemented, would be approximately \$7.1 million and would change as the taxable property value of the city changes.

Proposal: On June 28, 2021, the Billings City Council adopted Ordinance 21-5760 referring this ballot to the voters. If approved, this ballot measure would add the following language to the City Charter as Section 1.05.2: Section 1.05.2 Mill Levy to Fund Police, Fire, Prosecution Services, Code Enforcement, Municipal Court, Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services, and Related Public Safety Expenses. For the purpose of funding the operation, maintenance and capital needs of the police department, fire department, prosecution services, code enforcement, municipal court, mental health and substance abuse services, and related public safety expenses, the City Council shall levy up to 34 mills starting in fiscal year 2023, which will raise approximately \$7,115,000. The foregoing mill levy is permanent and shall continue indefinitely in future fiscal years. This levy is not cumulative which means the number of mills will not increase over time. This levy is in addition to any other mill levies authorized by Charter or law. Residential Property Impact: If approved, the annual property tax increase in fiscal year 2023 on a home valued at \$100,000 is approximately \$45.90 per year. The annual property tax increase in fiscal year 2023 on a home valued at \$200,000 is approximately \$91.80 per year.

Shall the City be authorized to amend the City Charter to add Section 1.05.2 to levy up to 34 mills raising approximately \$7.1 million to support police, fire, prosecution services, code enforcement, municipal court, mental health and substance abuse services, and related public safety expenses?





I'm not sure if my previous email went through or not since I cant find it in my "Sent" folder.. Here are some answers to your questions.

- 1. Attached you will find the approval letter from GPAC.
- 2. Bike storage will be in the cook shack building by Graywolf Inn. The batteries area "smart battery" and a "smart charger" and will shut off automatically when the battery is full.
- 3. I also talked to Juan Trujillo from the police department in West Yellowstone. According to the specs on our bikes and scooters, they are considered non-motorized vehicles in the Town of West Yellowstone and with the state of Montana. Sarah Mallory from Custer Gallatin National Forest did mention that these are considered motorized vehicles in the forest. She did provide me a trail map and it didn't seem like there were too many trails that were marked as non-motorized, but I would like to provide a map for each customer.

Here is an email that I sent to Elizabeth Roos. I thought I would also include it in this email.

Attached you will see the approval letter from the Grizzly Architectural Committee. Glenn emailed it to me so I could get it to you quicker. I also wanted to follow up to make sure we are on the agenda for the April 5th town board meeting.

One thing I would like to do is to have a trail map for each bike that I would like to laminate and highlight the trails that are legal for e-bikes.
